Background

The purpose of the Annual Progress Report is to publish an extensive amount of student achievement information for public review. Note that all information included in this year's re-

port is from the 2014-15 School Year. The entire report will be broken down into four parts with one part published in each edition of the Cadet Gazette from now through the end of the school year. Part 1: Adequate Yearly Progress

Part 1 features achievement data for Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). AYP is directly tied to compliance with the federal mandate, No Child Left Behind (NCLB). Accomplishment of all goals associated with Adequate Yearly Progress

(AYP) is determined by the Iowa Department of Education in compliance with the federal government's NCLB Legislation.

The requirement for Iowa (and all other states) is that 100 percent of all students must be proficient. A school building that misses one, or more, of the multiple goals for reading, math or "other academic indicators" will cause the building to be labeled as "Missing AYP."


The Iowa Assessments are not given to students below grade 3. Consequently, the state back maps third grade results to Pineview so that every school building is accountable for student achievement.

District Attendance Policy and Reminders

Communication is key! Please ensure communication with your child's teacher/ office as to your child's absence(s) so we can support your child if there is illness as well as document illnesses for state records, appointments and if there is any barriers to getting your child to school timely, so we can explore options for your child's success! Rick Dunn, Hardin Co. Attorney did meet with school staff last year recognizing the importance of school beginning from kindergarten through high school, thus will be getting involved with chronic absences as they arise.

The policy of the District is that consistent and punctual attendance is of vital importance and is a prerequisite for completing an education. Attendance is a shared responsibility and requires cooperation and communication among students, parents and school. Students are expected to be in class and to make attendance a top priority. Only through attendance and class participation do students achieve the benefits of the education program. Participating in class discussion, developing an appreciation for the views and abilities of other students and forming the habit of regular attendance are legitimate class objectives. Learning lost due to an absence can never be replaced. Regular attendance and being well

prepared for class helps students in school as well as prepares students for adult-hood. Students with chronic absences can be identified as at risk and they will be referred to the at risk support team.

Whenever possible, discipline imposed because of absence problems shall not create further class absences. The following disciplinary measures may be used by school authorities as consequences for attendance violations:

1. Upon acquiring 6 absences (excused or unexcused) parents or guardians will be contacted by a member of the at risk team stressing the importance of attendance and the connection to educational success.

2. Upon acquiring 8 absences from school a meeting will be set up with parents by a member of the at risk team to discuss reducing absences. The county attorney will also be carbon copied with notes from this meeting.

3. Upon acquiring 10 absences from school, a meeting will held between a member of the at risk team, student and parent to develop a formal attendance contract. A copy of this contract will be forwarded to the county attorney.

Students who miss three consecutive days of school due to illness, may be asked to provide a doctor's note or may have contact with the school nurse.

From the desk of Clyde Tarrence, IFAHS Principal

We've had a great kickoff to the 2015-16 school year! Our theme for the year is "SPIRIT." SPIRIT is "the general atmosphere of a place or situation and the effect that it has on people." We base our spirit upon showing a positive attitude and servitude to others. We also know when we have spirit as a team, we can achieve together what would remain out of reach for us individually. We communicate openly and candidly with each other and extend our respect and team spirit to students, parents and community members. It's about showing the utmost respect to each other by going directly to the person to share concerns. This starts by building daily relationships, not just with each other, but also with students and parents.

I would like to thank all parents and students for attending our Open House on August 20. The staff and I are really excited for the changes this year that will help ALL students of Iowa Falls-Alden High School. We were able to share with you our goals of Multi-Tiered System of Support that will occur between 6th and 7th period from 1:25-1:45 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. We feel it will help reduce the number of D's and F's, help student engagement, reduce drop out rates and allow a time for all teachers at the same time of day to help students who are struggling in academics. I also shared Gov. Branstad's Teacher Leadership Compensation Grant (TLC) that Iowa Falls-Alden was selected to implement into the 2015-16 school year. Digital Citizenship was at the forefront that parents and students have shared with us from the Clarity Survey they took last year.

We were able to bring in Mark Sigwarth from the Iowa State Patrol to educate students and parents about social media. I think the presentation was an eye opener for many parents and students. I also shared the importance of parent involvement is as important as it was during your student's time in elementary. A lot of parents feel they have done their job by just getting them to high school. Actually, it's just as important to be hands-on and help students when they visit colleges or when looking into careers that they possibly will be doing for the rest of their lives. I ask parents to please get involved, whether it's attending Parent Advisory meetings that are held monthly, helping class sponsors decorating for Homecoming or Prom, working in concessions or just bringing ideas to the school. We all need to work together. We want the same things that you want for your son and daughter and that is the chance to be successful in whatever they do. This takes teamwork between parents and teachers. We may have bumps and successes while were on this road, but we need to present a positive approach to our young people on how to handle those issues that may come up.

Enrollment has finally settled down and we are pretty close to last year's totals. In ninth grade we have 114 students, 10th grade 125 students, 11th grade 112 students and 12th grade around 98 students. All 9th and 10th grade students will be taking the MAP Test through the week of September 14-18.

The President of UNI contacted us and he would like to visit our school to talk with our teachers, students and administrators. Dr. Ruup will be visiting Iowa Falls-Alden High School on Wednesday, September 23. We were selected because of all the great things he has heard about the Iowa Falls School District.

Homecoming is quickly approaching. Homecoming Week is September 28 through October 2. Please keep our policies in mind.

The school district will file criminal trespassing charges against any person who is knowingly on school property while an act of destroying, defacing and/or vandalizing school property is taking place. If a person who is charged with criminal trespass is a student in the Iowa Falls Community School District, then additional school disciplinary actions may be enacted. Disciplinary actions may include, but are not limited to, suspension, expulsion and loss of extra-curricular eligibility. If a person who is charged with criminal trespass is not a student in the Iowa Falls Community School District, then the school district will legally prohibit this person from entering

or remaining upon any property owned by the Iowa Falls Community School District for no less than one year.

Did you know....

Students may not possess radios, CD players, televisions, water guns, toys and other similar items on school grounds or at school activities. Electronic beepers, pagers, recording devices and cell phones will not be allowed unless advance permission is granted from the principal. The use of cell phones and iPod type devices may not be used from 8:25 a.m. to 3:16 p.m. each day. No device is permitted which allows students to send or receive personal messages that would contribute to cheating, access the internet or take pictures in the locker room or restroom, are not to take pictures of another for the purpose of ridiculing the other person, are not to use electronic device to harass another person. Inappropriate use of a device, the item will be taken from the student and brought to the office. Students found in violation of this policy may be subject to discipline (to include suspension from school and activities), parent notification and,

in cases where a law may be violated, law enforcement may be contacted. On the first offense, the student may pick up the device at the end of the school day. All subsequent offenses the parent must pick up the device. The school is not responsible for the loss or theft of any device brought to the office. Students need to remember that whatever they put on a personal electronic device could end up anywhere so they need to ensure the devices are used appropriately. Cell phones and electronic devices are subject to search when a school official has a reasonable and articulable suspicion that the device contains illegal, harassing or contraband items, pictures, messages or evidence of a violation of law or school policy or rule.

Did you know....

There is a strong connection between student academic performance, appearance and conduct. Inappropriate student appearance may cause material and substantial disruption to the school environment or present a threat to the health and safety of students, employees and visitors on school grounds. Students are expected to adhere to reasonable levels of cleanliness and modesty.

Students are prohibited from wearing clothing advertising or promoting items illegal for use by minors including, but not limited to, alcohol, drugs or tobacco; from wearing shoes with cleats except for outdoor athletic practices; from wearing clothing displaying obscenity, profanity, vulgarity, racial or sexual remarks, making reference to prohibited conduct or similar displays; and from wearing clothing that identifies them as members of "gangs" which promote expressions of violence, bigotry, hate and abuse. Shoes are required at all times. Shorts may be worn at the student's discretion. Sunglasses, hats, bandanas, hooded sweatshirts and other such headdresses are not to be worn unless there is a medical necessity. Students may not wear halter-tops, spaghetti straps (less than 1 inch) or bare midriff styles or any apparel that reveals any portion of undergarments.

Under certain circumstances or during certain classes or activities a stricter dress code may be appropriate, and students must comply with the stricter requirement. The principal makes the final determination of the appropriateness of the student's appearance. Students inappropriately dressed are required to change their clothing or leave the school property. Women's tops that allow for visible bra straps or undergarments will not be allowed. All student garments should cover the chest, belly, back, sides and buttocks at all times. Jeans that have holes in them may NOT show any private areas.

Did you know....

If a student is failing a class at the time of a grade check, that student will not be eligible to compete or perform in a school sponsored activity for a minimum of one week (Monday through Sunday evening) and will regain eligibility once they are passing all classes.

The grade shown as of 4 p.m. Sunday afternoon will be used for the grade check, with no exceptions (i.e. - "I had late work that was turned in but not yet entered," "I was on vacation and have zeros for those assignments" or "But I have a really important performance, game, meet, etc.").

Communication between the student and teacher will take care of most situations and prevent students from failing at that time. MTSS time will certainly help too – help students to be proactive and take ownership of their education.

This will affect very few students, but we want to be sure everyone is aware of the new procedure. Our number one priority is education and progress toward graduation for all students.



Riverbend Middle School to Host Fall Dance on Thursday, October 29, Starting at 7:00 p.m.

The first Riverbend Middle School dance of the 2015-2016 school year is scheduled to be held on Thursday, October 29, at Riverbend Middle School. Although this is called a dance, this is in reality more of a middle school "social," due to the numerous activities that are planned for the evening. A disc jockey will be set up in half of the gymnasium for the dance portion of the event. In addition, throughout the evening students can participate in karaoke and board games in the cafeteria, Wii Guitar Hero and Just Dance in the music room, a movie in another classroom and the student lounge will also be open for students. Concessions will be available for purchase throughout the evening in the cafeteria, including Pizza Ranch pizza and Cadet Concessions.



In addition, it is also important to note that Riverbend Middle School dances are not "formal events." We like to think of our dances as "come as you are" events. We want all Riverbend students to feel that they can attend the event without having to worry about wearing new clothes or dresses. Students can choose to dress up if they want, but it is not encouraged by Riverbend Middle School. All students are expected to follow the Riverbend Middle School handbook dress code expectations for their dance attire: "Clothes that are too tight, too short, or too revealing are not to be worn. Students may not wear halter tops or bare midriff styles or any apparel that reveal portions of undergarments." These expectations are included in our student handbook. No strapless dresses or "spaghetti straps" are to be worn. Students not following these expectations should be prepared to change. In short, students, if you have to ask yourself if it is appropriate to wear to a dance or not, then it probably is not. Your assistance with these expectations is appreciated.

Riverbend Middle School students also do not need to feel that they need to have a "date" to attend a dance. Most students come by themselves, with a friend, or with a group of friends. Students can choose to ask someone if they want, but it is not encouraged by Riverbend Middle School. Only Riverbend Middle School students are allowed to attend middle school dances.

The dance starts at 7:00 p.m. and ends at 9:00 p.m. for seventh grade students, 9:15 p.m. for eighth grade students. The staggered ending times assist with the flow of traffic in front of the building after the dance. There will be a cost of admission as determined by the Riverbend Student Council to help offset the cost of the DJ. Glow-necklaces may also be available at the dance for purchase. Our dance will be supervised by at least twelve Riverbend Middle School teachers and staff.

Parent-Teacher-Student Conferences are scheduled at Riverbend Middle School from 3:30-7:30 p.m. on Thursday, October 8, and Tuesday, October 13. Strong Participation in Activities at Riverbend

Riverbend Middle School again had nearly all of our students participate in at least one activity during the 2014-2015 school year. Students at Riverbend had the following co-curricular activity choices: band, chorus, honor band, honor choir, and jazz band. In addition, students could choose to participate in the following extracurricular sports activities: football, volleyball, cross-country, basketball, wrestling, cheerleading, track & field, and softball. Students also had the opportunity to participate in a variety of clubs and organizations: dance team, student council, science club, art club, girls' group, FFA, FCCLA, TRIO Educational Talent Search, yearbook, publications, book club, and chess club. In all, there were 25 activities offered at Riverbend Middle School during the 2014-2015 school year. Each of our approximately 200 RMS students participated, on average, in nearly four activities per student.

During the first day of school this year, all students were presented with an activity interest sheet where they indicated what activities they are interested in for the 2015-2016 school year. Research has shown that students who are active in school activities are more connected to school, and that students who are more connected to school do better in school. It is our expectation that each student be involved in at least one activity; most are out for multiple. Get involved, Riverbend students!

Academic Eligibility for Middle School Extracurricular Activities

Middle school students are encouraged to participate in as many extracurricular activities as possible. Past research has shown that students who are involved in activities generally achieve academically higher than students who are not involved in these activities. Students who participate in extracurricular activities and school-sponsored clubs and organizations will be subject to the Riverbend Middle School Academic Eligibility Policy: Student grades will be checked every two weeks. All graded classes are included under this policy. If a student has one "F" at a grading checkpoint, he/she will be ineligible for a minimum of one week. If grades are passing after one week, he/she will regain eligibility. If not, they remain ineligible until grades are passing. While a student is ineligible, he/she must attend four study tables per week. Study tables will be from 7:45 – 8:15 a.m. and 3:15 - 3:45 p.m. All extra-curricular activities and before / after school clubs will be included in this policy. A student who is academically ineligible will be able to practice with his/her athletic team, and even travel with the team for competition, but will not be able to participate in competition while academically ineligible.

An Opportunity for Parents / Guardians to Provide Feedback, Direction, and Leadership at Riverbend Middle School

The Riverbend Parent Advisory Council will meet monthly at Riverbend at noon on the second Thursday of each month. The purpose of this council is to learn about the day-to-day operations of the school, to serve as a sounding board, and to open the channels of communication between the principal and the parents / community. 
Riverbend Middle School Welcomes Back Mrs. Holly Meyer

Once the account is created, notices can be received via email, cell phones, or email capable PDAs. There is no limit to number of addresses in the account. If there is ever a delayed start to school on a Wednesday,

there will not be an early dismissal for teacher professional development that same day.

Iowa State Patrolman Mark Segworth Teaches Digital Citizenship

On Wednesday, August 20, Iowa State Patrolman Mark Segworth met with fifth grade through high school parents/guardians and students in the Iowa Falls-Alden Jerene Barlow Auditorium for two sessions on digital citizenship. Trooper Segworth has been with the Iowa State Patrol for 19 years, and eight of those years have served to educate families and the public.

"Students, you are LUCKY that the schools are providing you with computers to use," stated Trooper Segworth. "Technology is a PRIVILEGE, not a right. If you do not use the technology ethically, there are consequences. The Internet is a worldwide billboard. Once you post, you can't bring it back," continued Trooper Segworth. "Think before you post! Be careful what you post!"

"A lot of my presentation is going to be geared to the parents. By providing your son or daughter with a computer, the school has saved you a lot of money. With that computer comes responsibility." Trooper Segworth went on to address to parents and guardians the difference of the students growing up with technology while the parents/guardians did not. "Parents and computers often equals confusion. Facebook, for example, is often a smokescreen for other social media that the students are using without parents' knowledge." Trooper Segworth then listed several social media outlets that students have "at their fingertips all the time."

"Privatize stuff and be careful what you put out there," advised Trooper Segworth. He further advised students not to post pictures for anyone to see that can be used to

identify what school they attend, where they live, how old they are, what activities they participate in. "Anything you post could be used against you." He then went on to give the following advice before posting, "Take three deep breaths before posting. After three deep

breaths, ask yourself 'Is this a good idea?' If you have any inclination that this is not a good idea, do not post!"

Trooper Segworth then challenged the parents or guardians with some homework:

- Put your home / school computer in a family room, kitchen, or living room. Check the history to see what sites your child is visiting.
- Monitor your child's texts and data. If they abuse it, discontinue these services.
- Talk with your child about the dangers of sharing information on social media sites. The more information that is out there, they greater the chance they can be bullied or preyed upon.
- Establish rules. Discuss the rules. Get your child to adhere to them. Post them near the computer as a reminder. If rules are broken, computer privileges are gone.

Trooper Segworth then closed his presentation with the "Bottom Line":

- Don't lose it!
- Don't break it!
- Be careful what you post!
- Be careful who you chat with and share information with.
- You break the rules, then the school and parents need to do their job and agree on the ramifications.

Minutes read will be score boarded at Rock Run, so students and businesses can keep tabs on who's ahead. The challenge will wrap up in May...just in time for the Teachers to issue a challenge of their own.

Technology Galore

When you walk into a fifth grade classroom this year, what do you think you will see? We are thrilled to say that you will see every fifth-grader with their own laptop. The kids are very excited about this opportunity and are adjusting to managing their own computer throughout the day. Having computers has allowed us to integrate more technology into our daily routines. Students are learning how to use email appropriately, use Google classroom to complete assignments, use Google docs to collaborate on assignments, and much more. It has allowed teachers to find some great online opportunities for students to use to increase comprehension and keep up on current events. Newsela is a great site that allows kids to read non- fic- tion articles at all different reading levels and then



and marketing. They then learned about printmaking techniques as they completed their first linoleum block print. We are just starting to learn how to throw on the potter's wheel.



TEN Lessons the Arts Teach from the National Arts Education Association

- 1. The arts teach children to make good judgments about qualitative relationships, unlike much of the curriculum in which correct answers and rules prevail, in the arts, it is judgment rather than rules that prevail.
- 2. The arts teach children that problems can have more than one solution and that questions can have more than one answer.

- 3. The arts celebrate multiple perspectives. One of their large lessons is that there are many ways to see and interpret the world.
- 4. The arts teach children that in complex forms of problem solving purposes are seldom fixed, but change with circumstance and opportunity. Learning in the arts requires the ability and a willingness to surrender to the unanticipated possibilities of the work as it unfolds.
- 5. The arts make vivid the fact that neither words in their literal form nor numbers exhaust what we can know. The limits of our language do not define the limits of our cognition.
- 6. The arts teach students that small differences can have large effects. The arts traffic in subtleties.
- 7. The arts teach students to think through and within a material. All art forms employ some means through which images become real.
- 8. The arts help children learn to say what cannot be said. When children are invited to disclose what a work of art helps them feel, they must reach into their poetic capacities to find the words that will do the job.
- 9. The arts enable us to have experience we can have from no other source and through such experience to discover the range and variety of what we are capable of feeling.
- 10. The arts' position in the school curriculum symbolizes to the young what adults believe is important.

have been spending the last few weeks learning about our new friends, new class routines, and learning about being a leader using Covey's 7 Habits! We have been practicing how to be leaders at recess, in the lunchroom, the hallways, and in the classroom.

Pineview First Graders Get A "Boost-Up"

The first-graders at Pineview Elementary are enjoying "Boost Up!" During Boost Up, first-graders learn and practice skills that involve crossing the mid-line, using upper body muscles, gross motor muscles and brain stimulating activities.

Boost-up is a multi sensory approach to learning and involves brain stimulation activities to help prepare children to learn. The program develops visual, auditory, balance, fine and gross motor skills, which are all essential for classroom and academic success. These activities also improve each child's physical fitness, strength, coordination and ability to pay attention. Some activities include: crawling, creeping, balancing, rolling, and eye tracking. Once these readiness





skills are in place, the children will have the foundation necessary to succeed in school. They are truly getting a "Boost-Up!"

2nd Grade Subject Spotlight on Writing

This year the second grade students are switching classes in the morning for 30 minutes of work on different subjects. In Mr. Johnson's room they are focusing on writing. This year the students will be focusing on the 6-Traits of Writing. Each month of the school year will focus on one of the traits. In September and October we will focus on Ideas and Content. In November we will focus on Organization where kids will make sure their stories have beginnings, middles, and endings. In December we will focus



on Word Choice where students will be challenged to use strong verbs and interesting adjectives. In January we will focus on Sentence Fluency where students will work on varying sentence length and fixing run-on and rumbling sentences. In February we will focus on Voice where students will need to use formal and informal language and use different writing styles. In March we will focus on Conventions. The rest of the school year will be spent working on perfecting our writing skills by writing creative stories. What Is Reading Recovery?

"Just give me that book. I can read it myself." Hearing those words is every Reading Recovery teacher's dream. It is the goal of the Reading Recovery program to develop strategic independent readers. Iowa Falls has endorsed this philosophy through the Reading Recovery Program for the last 18 years, serving 273 students. The district has three Reading Recovery teachers: Miss Adams, Mrs. Hastings, and Mrs. Hunt. They not only use this training with Reading Recovery students, but also to effectively reach Title I Reading students in kindergarten, first and second grade.

Reading Recovery is an individualized program for selected first-graders. Each child receives a 30-minute one-on-one lesson designed to work on early reading and writing strategies. During each lesson the student rereads familiar books, learns how words work, writes sentences about the books he/she reads or happenings in their lives, and reads a new book that is slightly more challenging. Through running records and observations, teachers form teaching points to direct a student's learning. Teachers encourage rereading, learning word chunks, and checking the picture. Within the lesson, students work on fluency and flexibility in both reading and writing. Students build up a writing vocabulary of known words and learn to stretch through new words they want to use in their writing.

Parents are a vital part of this program. Daily home reading practice is essential for the student's success. Classroom teachers and Reading Recovery teachers work closely to help the students make progress. A student is ready to be discontinued (graduated) from the program when he/she is independently reading and writing at the average of their class. The goal is for the child to have a self-extending system that allows him/her to read increasingly difficult text as he/she continues through school. Reading strategies taught in the Reading Recovery program are good for all children. The techniques taught in the Reading Recovery program are the same strategies that are taught in the classrooms. They are just selectively taught, as a child needs them in an individualized manner. Since all of us become better readers by reading and reading often, it is important for all students to practice reading books at his/her reading level every day.

Everyone has heard the proverb "Practice makes perfect." In learning to read it is true that reading practice—just reading—is a powerful contributor to the development of accurate, fluent, high-comprehension reading (Allington, 2009a).

At every age level, reading more pages/minutes in school and at home each day was associated with higher reading scores. All children need to acquire the ability to read for at least 30 minutes a day independently.

With this research in mind, a school-wide goal committee was set up. The theme for the year is "Read to the Outer Limits." Our goal is to get kids to read more and in turn, increase reading achievement. Classrooms have set their goals and each class will be racing to all the planets.

Information was sent home in the Wednesday folders and teachers have sent home reading logs to track minutes read at home. Please do your part to support our schoolwide goal.

Here is one more piece of research on why reading outside of school is so important (Anderson, Wilson & Fielding 1988):


